RIME HAS INCREASED THIS YEAR in the County and in the Nation, and perhaps even more so in our neighborhood. As we move forward to address these issues, we hope that you, as a community will become more aware, educated, and involved in helping to protect our sense of security as a long-standing neighborhood. This article will not only provide information about neighborhood crime, but about what you can do to help avoid it and what to do when you witness it. The ISCA Board and ISCA Neighborhood Watch volunteers (remember your Block Captains—see the list online or in this newsletter) are available for questions and suggestions.

A Serious Incident in the ISCA Neighborhood

As you may or may not know, a shooting occurred on July 31st in our neighborhood. Please take note that this article written on September 1, provides and highlights the following: 1) information on the shooting; 2) information about crimes in general over the last 3 months in this neighborhood and 3) discusses some thoughts on what we can do about all these crimes.

During discussions with the police in several meetings, emails and phone calls, the following information was compiled. According to the police and victim, on July 31 between 10:30 and 11:00 pm, one of ISCA's

Newsletter Coordinators Ali Breen Audrey Cowgill s IT JUST ME, or did this summer fly by really quickly? The kids are back in school, the weather's gotten a little crisper, and the Sun's already down by 8pm (really 7pm if we weren't on Daylight Savings time). Anyway, didn't we just do the Taste of Indian Spring a couple of days ago? Feels like it.

Last Spring the board and I were re-elected to another term. As the Fall season begins, I want to thank you for your continued confidence in us. We look forward to serving this community for another year.

We are particularly concerned about the increase in crime in our neighborhood. I could tell by the turnout at the National Night Out Against Crime in August and the postings on the listserv that you're concerned, too.

Neighborhood Watch Coordinator Tony Hausner has written a comprehensive article about crime in this issue and I encourage you to read it. ISCA is continuing to dialogue and put pressure on the police to take crime in our neighborhood seriously and to step up patrols. But it still falls on us to take common sense preventative measures—and to report suspicious persons or activity to the police.

There has been some debate on the listserv about *how* to best report suspicious activity, but the police—on two different occasions—have been extremely clear: don't hesitate to report suspicious activity to 9-1-1. As Lt. Eric Burnett of the Montgomery County Police explained at the National Night Out, 9-1-1 calls go into a queue according to priority, so you aren't distracting the police from real emergencies by calling. Lt. Burnett suggests letting the police prioritize things.

The police have also counseled us not to be afraid of "crying wolf"—either as individuals, or as a neighborhood—to go with our gut feeling if something seems suspicious and, once again, let the police respond as appropriate. We have now heard this message twice directly from the police: they *want* to hear from us. So whether you choose to call 9-1-1 or the non-emergency number, the most important thing is to contact the police when you see anything or anyone that seems suspicious or out of place.

I want to thank Tony Hausner for his work this summer to assist the police and help keep our neighborhood safe. He and other members of the Board have been doing the lion's share of the work—keeping ISCA functional, publishing the newsletter, and coordinating excellent community functions like the Fall Fest, the Taste of Indian Spring, the Neighborhood Clean Up, and many more. We also greatly appreciate Celeste Raker-Dillen for all her efforts in organizing our social events. Some of these folks have been shouldering the burden for a long time and could definitely use some help. So please, step up to the plate—get involved in the social committee or Neighborhood Watch or any other aspect of ISCA that interests you. I know everyone's busy, but whatever time you can find to help out will be much appreciated! Here's to a happy and safe Fall season.

National Night Out

Lt. Eric Burnett Speaks to Gathering

ATIONAL NIGHT OUT, observed on Tuesday evening, August 5th, brought together at the Rec Center, members of our community and several officers of the Montgomery County Police Department. LT Burnett gave a brief overview of concerns regarding crimes in our area, but stressed that we live in what he considers "a very safe neighborhood". There was much concern among residents about the recent robbery attempt and shooting of an Indian Spring resident and LT Burnett invited the adults present to hear his review of what was known

about this crime. Residents asked many questions about this incident as well as other crimes in this area. LT Burnett shared that several arrests had been made for various crimes. In response to a question about the age of the perpetrators, he stated that they ran the gamut from teens to adults. Since the most reported crime in this area is car break-ins, he shared tips for avoiding being a victim of this crime. He stressed locking one's car and not leaving valuables in view. He also stressed calling 911 for any suspicious behavior, urging us to let the police decide the priority of the call.

We would like to encourage everyone to report any suspicions or crimes to the police and to the neighborhood. Also please let us know of any arrests.

Information was available regarding home alarm systems, and car anti theft devices, as well as the 10 top guard dog breeds. More information is available on the neighborhood watch page at iscaonline.com including an excellent article on home safety by Washington Consumer Checkbook.

Ice cream was enjoyed by all as neighbors introduced themselves to each other and the sense of community, and the resolve to fight crime, was strengthened. Many thanks to Tony Hausner who is relentless in his goal of keeping our community safe.

residents got off the bus on Colesville Road and Leighton avenue. He started walking on Leighton avenue (that is the 400 block) going east. Shortly after he started walking, he encountered four males. The victim has described at least one of the suspects as being in his late teens or early twenties and possibly Latino. One of them asked him to hand over his possessions. The resident started to run away and the alleged robber shot him. The resident initially thought it was a minor wound.

He called 911 and within minutes police in several cars met him near Franklin and Leighton. The police initiated a k-9 search, but did not find any trace of the suspects. He has subsequently reported that when he went to the hospital, the staff informed him that it was a .22 caliber bullet. Fortunately, the physical wound was not very serious. Nevertheless, this has been a very disturbing experience for this resident and his family.

I have spoken and emailed several times with a number of members of the Silver Spring 3rd district police division about this incident, including Commander Johnson, two lieutenants, a Sergeant, key detectives, and our community relations officer. All of them were initially very responsive to my requests and suggestions. A number of them have had several contacts with the resident and his family, including Commander Johnson.

Our thoughts and prayers go out to the victim and his family as they deal with this terrible experience. We also pray that the police are able to capture these criminals.

How Neighbors (You!) Can Get Involved

National Night Out

For those of you who did/could not attend, Lt. Burnett addressed our neighborhood at National Night Out about general crime issues and how to keep safe. He then met separately with just the adults at National Night Out and discussed much of the information in this article. Also featured were crime prevention methods illustrated on large poster boards and heightened awareness about avoiding crime in our neighborhood.

ISCA Neighborhood Watch

ISCA and our neighborhood watch, including our president, Walter Gottlieb, and myself, take this event and the increase of thefts and burglaries extremely seriously, we have been working to assist the police with their investigation of the shooting and are committed to continuing to help fight crime and keep our neighborhood safe. Many of our other citizens have been helping the

family and/or have been supplying useful information to us, as they have in the past with other less serious crimes. This truly has been a community effort and as exemplified by the large turnout and interaction with the police leadership at National Night Out on August 5th. Since then, the police have not provided any additional details on the investigation of this incident as they do not want to compromise the investigation. However, they have increased patrols in this neighborhood in response to this and other incidents. While we urge neighbors to report suspicious activity directly to the police, we also urge you to communicate with your block captains and me to help facilitate the investigative process. As you are aware, details such as license plates, make and models of cars, descriptions of clothing such as color, and gender, approximate age, and number of potential suspects involved, are needed by police to make arrests and provide evidence in building a case.

We plan to soon have a future meeting with police leaders to talk further about crime in our neighborhood.

Recent Crime Statistics for the ISCA Neighborhood

The following is a summary of crimes that have occurred in our neighborhood between 5/22 and 8/16/08. Pleases note that the majority of the crimes involve vehicle thefts and burglaries, crimes that can be prevented if we all work together. This information is primarily based on data from crimereports.com compiled by Joyce Stocker of our neighborhood.

Of the 16 streets where crime occurred, those with the most frequent serious crimes included in no definite order: Leighton Ave, Franklin Ave, Caroline Ave, Evergreen Street, Biltmore Ave, Normandy Drive, Brewster Ave, University Blvd., Hastings including the Y, E. Melbourne, and Moss Ave. So crime was pretty widespread in our neighborhood. I have shared this data with the Silver Spring Community Relations Officer, Joy Patil. I do not have data from previous years but it seems to me that crime has increased significantly this past year in this neighborhood. This is the first shooting that I can recall. Officer Patil will pull data from 2007 and 2008 and compare trends in our area.

What to Do If You Witness or Are Aware of A Crime Happening

If you see or know of a crime, or see something suspicious, please report it to the police immediately and also report to the listsery and to the block captain. If no one else reports it to the listsery, please take the initiative to report it. Some in our neighborhood are not comfortable in reporting such incidents. If need be, just list the block number, e.g., 400 block of Leighton. It is critical no matter what the seriousness of the incident, to report to the police. If for no other reason, the more calls the police get from a neighborhood, the more likely they will patrol and investigate. If you know of an arrest and then later a conviction, please let us know. Letting your neighbors know that progress has been made in solving a crime and that the perpetrator involved may not be committing the crime again, can really help us all feel better about working and living together in ISCA.

Crime Prevention in ISCA

Based on my years of involvement and experience, I have the following advice for the neighborhood. Please visit our website iscaonline.com and review the neighborhood watch section. There are very useful materials, including a valuable article by Washington Consumer Checkbook on making your home more secure.

Join our neighborhood watch. There is material on the website with a list of current block captains (see below). There is very little time expected of a block captain. Even if there is already a block captain, we can use more than one per block. One final note, here is a brief recap of what Lt. Burnett said at National Night Out:

- Residents are the eyes and ears of the police.
 Report suspicious activities or persons (and noises) to the police at once by calling 9-1-1.
 The calls go into a queue according to priority; so you don't have to worry that your call will tie up resources for responding to actual emergencies.
- Go with your gut feeling about what's suspicious or unusual and don't be afraid to report something that might turn out to be nothing. The police will check it out.

- Be cautious when walking the dog, taking a walk, or jogging at night, and try not to go alone late at night.
- Join ISCA's Neighborhood Watch program and become a block captain.

In a subsequent email, here is his advice on dealing with thefts from vehicles:

- 1. Take all valuables out of your car or remove from sight (during the day) when you leave your vehicle and lock your vehicle at all times.
 - 2. Do not leave spare change in the center console.
- 3. Remove all computer equipment from your vehicle (lap tops, PDU, I-Pods etc)
- 4. Remove your portable GPS from the vehicle, and the mounts you place on the windshield. (Do not place in Glove compartment, take in house)

Our watch brochure provides further guidance, e.g., on what is suspicious activities. The National Crime Prevention Council also has useful information.

Block Captains

Block captains have the following responsibilities. They primarily are a point of contact if any crime or

suspicious activity occurs on the block. In addition to posting information on the Indian Spring listserv, the residents of the block would notify the captain or ask them about such activity. Secondary duties that are helpful but not essential are to convene a meeting of your block so that everyone knows each other, hand out once every couple of years the watch brochure, put together a list of residents on the block, and let your block know of the availability of an engraver. Many blocks have block parties that serve the meeting goal. These activities only require a few hours per year at most.
