The special guest for the evening was Lieutenant Robert Carter of the 3rd district who answered a range of questions on crime and safety, both in our neighborhood and in Silver Spring and the surrounding areas.

The other issues discussed were zoning (Tony Hausner), the time bank project (Lindy Burnett) and activities at the neighborhood Y.

The planning board is working to simplify the zoning codes in the county. Tony is seeking volunteers to help

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PRESIDENT'S COLUMN




about the community open house at the Y planned for the 26th (Wednesday) from 5pm to 8pm. The doors will be open to non-members to check out the facilities and explore pathways to a healthier lifestyle. Additionally the Y is starting a new partnership with Giant to encourage healthy and nutritious eating. The Y is planning a summer International youth exchange with a youth exchange with Spain.

Lt. Robert Carter who has been policing in Silver Spring for 23 years, then engaged in a lively and informative question-answer session with the audience on a variety of topics. Here are some of the highlights:

- When you see something unusual happening, should you call 911? Yes, absolutely! Calling 911 is always a good idea. Police would rather spend time following up a call even if it is a false alarm than have to deal with the aftereffects of a real crime. You can also call 311 for non-emergency items but it is easier to do online at http://www3.montgomerycountymd.gov/311/
- Vigilant neighborhood—it pays to have a neighborhood like ISCA where people keep an eye out for unusual activity, strange vehicles, etc. It is rare that police happen in on suspicious activity and catch the bad guys in the act. Most arrests are the result of a neighbor or resident's tip.
- Most thefts from cars happen when the cars are left unlocked. Thieves are always pulling on door handles and look for unlocked cars for crimes of opportunity. Loose change, GPS units and CDs are the most commonly stolen items, most of which is hawked on the street. Smarter cars and entry systems have made thefts from autos more rare—there were 500 fewer cases in Silver Spring last year.

- The two best deterrents for crime—having a home alarm system and a dog. Nightime burglaries are up—usually the perpetrators are juveniles looking for unoccupied houses.
 When there is a suspicious knock on the door, usually letting them know that someone is in the house (by turning a light on or making a noise) causes them to flee.
 It is very rare that someone would break into an occupied house.
- Gang activity, especially at schools, continues to be troublesome. Gangs are based on ethnicities. Schools have to step up and ensure that when school is let out early the students board buses and get home instead of congregating and causing problems. Good news is that ISCA does not have a gang problem. If a house in the neighborhood seems to spell trouble (like the one on University), the most effective solution is to call code enforcement, when there are broken windows, uncut lawns, cars in the yard, etc.
- Budget cuts are coming and this will affect how patrols are conducted. Nearly 110 positions will be eliminated in the county; officers will be moved from geo-based patrols (officers assigned to a neighborhood) to a timebased deployment and as a result we won't get the same attention as now.
- Neighborhood watches are extremely valuable, as is an active listserv. The Internet has allowed us to share information immediately.

We are very thankful to Lt. Carter for his time and energy and for sharing useful information with the community. **




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




Seven Students Announced as Intel Science Talent Search Semifinalists

Semifinalists receive scholarship money and chance to present research in Washington, D.C.

even seniors were named semifinalists in the Intel Science Talent Search (STS) competition on Wednesday. Semifinalists will continue their research in the hopes of being selected as a finalist later this month.

Elizabeth Duval, who teaches the Senior Research Project (SRP) class of the Magnet program, explained that STS is a research competition, designed for outstanding science students to present original research to nationally recognized professional scientists. "Students are selected not just for their research, but also for their potential as futures researchers," she said.

This year, STS selected 300 semifinalists from a total of 1,744 applicants, according to the STS website. Seven of those finalists came from Blair. Duval explained that a large number of her students apply to STS each year. "We usually have a good, strong representation," she said. Duval recalled that only two schools had a higher number of semifinalists than Blair.

Magnet program students take a research course that begins at the start of their junior year, which is followed by a summer internship, during which students conduct their own research, Duval explained. Often times, students in the course choose to submit to STS because they already have the work complete, she added.

In March, finalists are invited to Washington, D.C., to participate in final judging, display their work and talk to notable scientists. The top participants compete for an award of \$100,000.

Duval expressed how competitive STS is. "Even making it to the top 300 is huge," she said. These seven Blair semifinalists will be placed into a pool from which 40 finalists will be selected by Jan. 26, Duval predicted. "I'm very hopeful that at least one [Blair student] will be selected," Duval said. **

The Green Column

y family has pledged to reduce our use of resources by 10% in 2011, both for environmental and budgetary reasons. As we watch gasoline prices edge up penny by penny, we decided to focus on our gasoline usage. A useful website with practical ideas is http://www.dailyfueleconomy. Here are seven suggestions taken from that site:

- 1. Don't drive if you don't have to. Instead of driving to the Blair track or to the path along Sligo Creek to do fitness walking, I now sometimes just walk the neighborhood. Walking up and down the small hills of the streets in my area gives a better workout, as well. And because I make an almost daily trip to the Giant, I've started making a weekly menu to save last-minute trips, and now buy pet food in larger bags. A friend often calls to ask if I need anything from the Giant, saving me a trip. I plan to do the same for her.
- 2. Minimize idling: if you know you'll be idling for more than 1–2 minutes, it's recommended that you turn off the car. I've started doing this at the traffic lights at Four Corners.

- **3. Coast whenever you can.** Constantly braking and accelerating reduces fuel economy.
- **4. Accelerate and stop smoothly.** I'm always surprised to see drivers rushing by me to stop at the red light!
- **5. Drive at or near the speed limit.** Speeding increases fuel usage by 7–23%.
- 6. Make sure tires are properly inflated. It takes extra energy to drive on improperly inflated tires—think of riding a bike with flat tires. Because I hate checking my tire pressures, my brother bought me tire valve caps which display a red band if my tire pressure is low. Now, at a glance I can see if I need to add air. They cost about \$5 for 4, and must be purchased for the psi for your tires.
- **7. Remove extra weight from the car and trunk.** For every 100 lbs the fuel economy decreases by 1–2%.

I'm taking that case of Duraflame logs out of the trunk now! *
