Minutes from ISCA Meeting, May 16, 2011

The ISCA meeting on May 16th, 2011 was moderately well attended and featured guest speakers that discussed new and ongoing developments in downtown Silver Spring.


The meeting began with a vote on the ISCA board candidates and the current office holders were unanimously approved. The post of Vice President of the Social Committee is still open and the board is looking for volunteers.

Then Heidi Whitesell, chair of the Franklin Avenue Pedestrian and Traffic Safety Committee updated everyone on traffic calming issues on Franklin Avenue. There have been several accidents recently and as we know there are many speeders and other looking on this busy route as well as cut-throughs that spill over into other neighborhood streets. The final report from the study is not in, but engineers measured traffic flow and speeds using rubber tubing on the pavement. The requirement for a getting a speed camera installed is that 85% of the traffic must exceed 39 mph. Preliminary indications are that this requirement was not met. It is not known over what length of time the tests were conducted. The tests indicate that the portion west of Flower qualifies for speed bumps. Franklin also qualifies for sidewalks on both sides, and these are fairly easy to get. There are some line-of-sight issues that need to be addressed by home owners whose property fronts Franklin. These involve bushes or shrubs that need to be trimmed back so drivers and pedestrians can be visible to each other with enough time to stop if needed. Jill will assign someone to contact the property owners on this matter; the county will also provide a letter if needed. There was also some discussion on traffic calming measures such as pedestrian safe havens (bump-outs), traffic chokers, etc., and the issue of cut-throughs. Other topics discussed: weight restrictions on Franklin, moving bus stop signage and fixing the bent or broken light poles (by Seminole). These and other matters will be the topic of discussion in an upcoming meeting of the traffic committee. so watch for Heidi's announcement.

Minutes from ISCA Meeting, May 16, 2011

Montgomery County Department of Parks Director and ISCA resident Mary Bradford then updated us on the noise from loudspeakers at Blair. Apparently other nearby neighborhoods requested that the speakers be directed towards the beltway, which unfortunately carries the sound to our neighborhood. The field can be used by anyone after school hours and there has been a change of command in the school system who are not as responsive to our concerns. Mary indicated that the sound levels were below the threshold when tested, but will ask for another random check. There may also be technical solutions such as sound-dampening products.

With the adverse budget situation, the parks department is closing down some community centers in neighborhoods, especially those with underutilized, wooden buildings which are already in bad shape. The community center in our neighborhood is well-utilized and kept up (recently painted) and of durable cinder-block construction, and is not on the list to be eliminated.

The general feeling was that the situation with the problems with the field near the Y was improving. With the county budget cuts, there will be reductions in the seasonal employees and consequently, no money for portable toilets and less frequent trash pickups in the field area.

Arlene Montemarano reported on the plans underway for the Independence day celebration, planned for the 10th of July. The neighborhood pickup band is looking for volunteers — a call for local talent will go out to the list.

Guest speakers, Reemberto Rodriguez of the Silver Spring Regional Center, and Evan Glass, member of the Silver Spring Citizen's Advisory Board then talked about the issues and goings-on in downtown Silver Spring. The Montgomery 311 service to find Government services and report problems is catching on and proving to be very useful. The Citizen's advisory board is tackling issues such as development, pedestrian safety, parking in the

downtown Silver Spring area. They put on the Taste of Fenton (see <http://silverspringdowntown.com>) in Fenton Village and it was a huge success with a lot of participation and interest, all at no cost to the taxpayer. Reemberto addressed some of the specific questions put to him such as:

What is being planned for City Place mall?

This is a gaping hole not addressed by the Silver Spring development. The property has changed ownership and the new owner is looking at development options. It is a unique concept and has not been easy to get it to work, especially in a downturn. Other development planned and underway: CVS will replace the old Hollywood videos next to the Whole Foods, at the intersection of Georgia and East-West highway there is the new Babe's sports bar, surprisingly family friendly. At Flower and Piney Branch, the Theater still has no bites for leases. The area is the subject of conversations with the Purple line, growth, etc. Making it work will be a challenge. Gil's at Dale and Piney Branch is good and needs our support.

What is behind the new Silver Spring town center?

A public/private partnership headed by the Peterson company is planning an apartment complex with parking. There is a list of lists and blogs maintained by Reemberto at <http://silverspringspeaks.blogspot.com> with more information.

The new library at Wayne and Fenton – this is an exciting development with an innovative lower level that is a reflection of the broader community. There will not be additional parking for library patrons beyond the parking garage at Wayne.

Silver Spring Transit Center: the center is scheduled to be unveiled in January 2012. It will have space for the Greyhound and Bolt bus lines. The original plans called for residential and office space, but these are on hold until the economy improves.

The Fillmore music center on Colesville and Georgia is to open in September. There will be discounts for community use of the space.

Neighborhood Whiz Kid Named a Model at Northwood High School

Indian Spring resident Calvin Kane has shown it's possible to excel simultaneously in the classroom and on the playing field as a busy high schooler.

Northwood High School recognized his special talents by honoring him with the 2011 Model Gladiator Award, which honors the school's top male and female student-athlete.

The Model Gladiator Award, now in its fourth year, recognizes Northwood seniors who exemplify the term "student-athlete." To qualify, the student must have played at least one sport for four years, performed at a high level academically, demonstrated leadership qualities, and committed to service activities.

Kane, a member of the Class 2011, was a three-year starter at offensive tackle in football and captain of the varsity gridders last fall. He also has been captain of Northwood's track and field teams, competing primarily in the shot put and discus, the past two years.

He doesn't hold any school records in his field events, but he has reached his personal goal of throwing 40 feet in the shot put—something he's been trying to do for the past two years, as it qualified him for post-season competition this spring.


"Calvin is the consummate team leader," says Northwood track coach Mark Brown. "He begins practice on time, he organizes the athletes for the


coaches, he directs them on and off of the field, and he helps his teammates if and whenever they need it.... Simply put, Calvin's talents can be replaced, Calvin cannot."

Northwood's football coach, Dennis Harris, echoed that sentiment, saying, "He led by example, never missing practice and always was positive...willing to go above and beyond for his team. He always helped with study hall and was an overall great person to be around for his high school years."

Calvin has attained a weighted GPA of 4.37 and accumulated 105 Student Service Learning hours. An academic tutor at Northwood, Kane has been admitted to the honors program at University of Maryland for fall 2011. He is the son of Vicki and Steven Kane.

In addition to school, Calvin works for the Montgomery County Department of Recreation as a member of the event staff that sets up and operates various special activities in the community. He also works as a referee for the county's elementary youth basketball program.

Calvin and the two other Model Gladiator Award winners were publicly feted at Northwood's Senior Athletes Banquet on May 25 at the Silver Spring Civic Center. They received financial gifts from the Northwood Athletic Boosters toward their post-secondary studies and engraved plaques. A perpetual plaque bearing their names will reside in the school's athletic awards showcase.

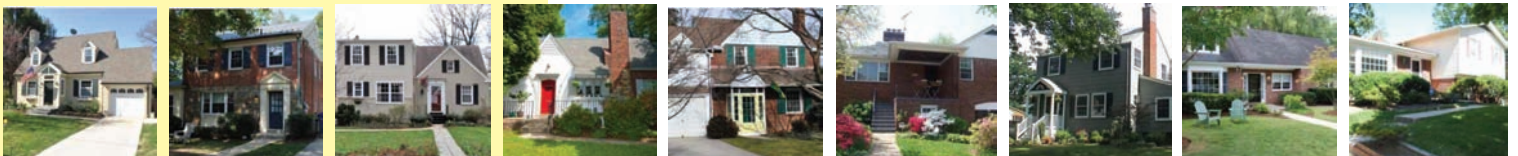

Silver Chips Online: Blazer gymnastics wins state competition Girls' team places first at states

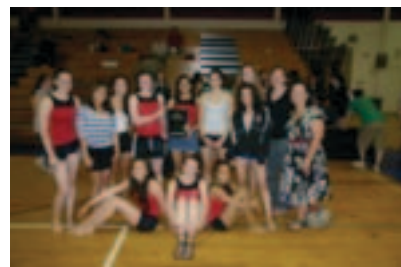
The Blair girls' gymnastics team won first place in the Maryland state competition in Anne Arundel County on May 11. This was the first time Blair gymnastics has won the division and state title in the 10 years since the program was created.

After placing second at counties to Walter Johnson (WJ), the Lady Blazers moved on to compete for the Bi-County title against the top two teams from the two counties that have gymnastics programs, Montgomery County and Anne Arundel County. Blair took first place with a score of 167.925, WJ scored second with 160.775, Severna Park placed third with 156.15 and Old Mill placed fourth with 154.3. Other competitors came from both counties' all-star teams, teams consisting of select gymnasts from the county competition to participate in individual events at the state competition.

A notable Blazer performance came from senior Sophie Seidell who placed second on beam with 9.3, second on floor with 9.3, fourth on vault with 8.9, fourth on bars with 8.9, and third all around with 36.4. Sophomore Kayla McCaw also tied for sixth place in beam with a 9.0. These strong individual performances along with solid scores from all of the Blazers contributed to their overall winning score. "We won because we have a solid team which meant that everyone was getting between seven and nine on every event," senior co-captain Claire Hoffman said.

Hoffman and coach Hillary Wynn attribute the Blazers' success over WJ, who placed first over Blair in counties, to the absence of WJ's strongest competitors. WJ's team has two level 10 gymnasts that participated during counties, but the girls were competing in nationals during the state competition, which hurt WJ's overall score. A level 10 gymnast is extremely skilled, almost at elite status. Even with WJ's top two gymnasts absent, Wynn was unsure about the outcome of the meet. "Competition was close – the scores vary between a couple of tenths and that is the difference between winning and losing," she said. "We knew it would be close with WJ at the end, so the pressure was on to stick all events by all competitors."

Wynn thought the Blazers performed especially well in their floor routines where the gymnasts incorporated more advanced tumbling techniques and skills. "They all did a great job and I am very proud of how they handled the pressure, their nerves and focused," Wynn said. "I couldn't have asked for them to be any better."

The line up and routines were the same as those performed during the county competition. Hoffman praised the girls for making quick last minute adjustments to the equipment. "We had to overcome some challenges with the equipment," she said. "A lot of it was old or couldn't expand to the size we are used to, but we did well considering."

Wynn attributed the win to the girls' determination and strong attitudes. "Contributing factors are their competitive nature, their wanting to better themselves and each other, and their great attitude and work efforts," Wynn said. Wynn also noted that the gymnasts had supportive coaches and said the girls never accepted less than their best effort.

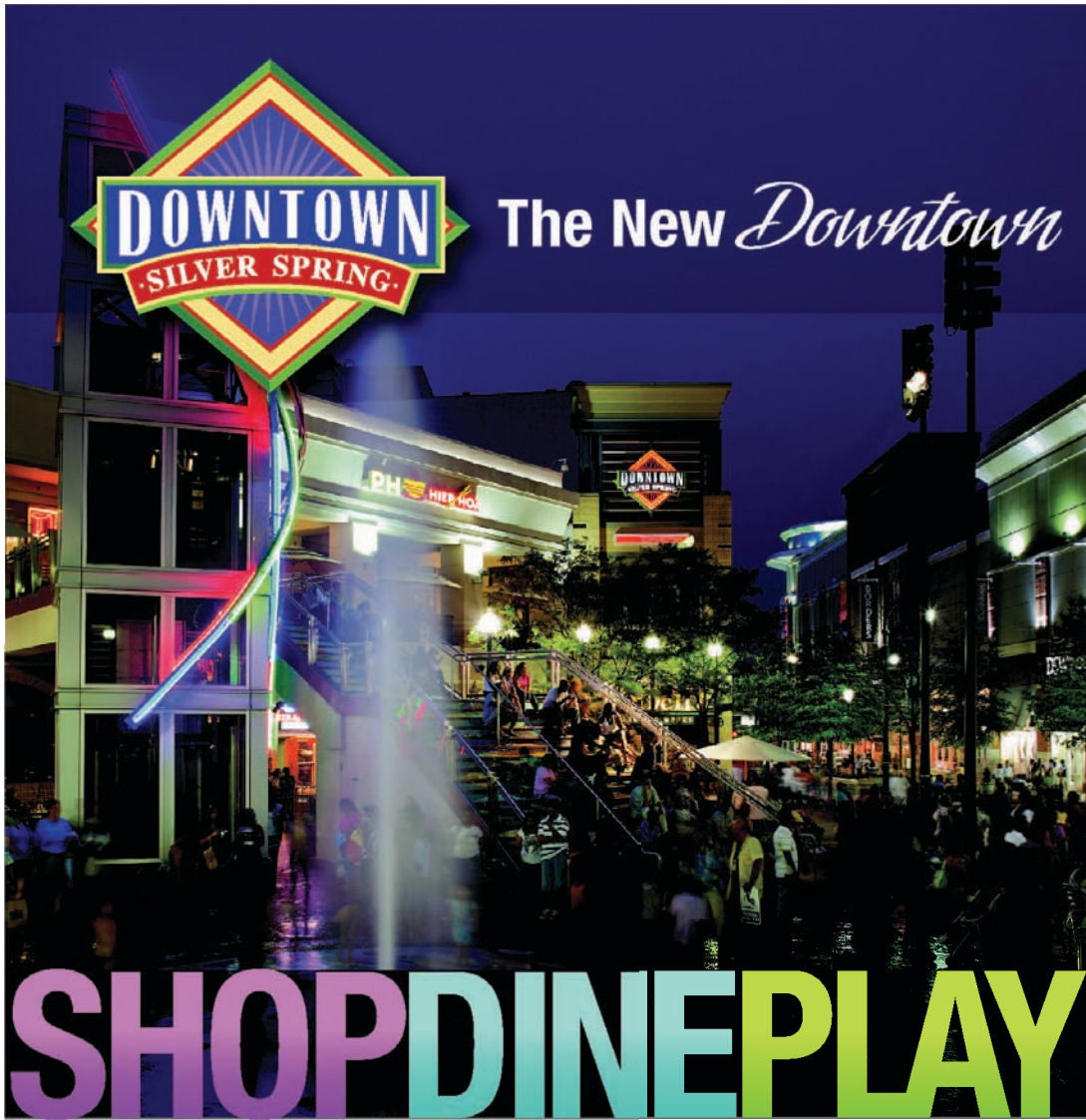

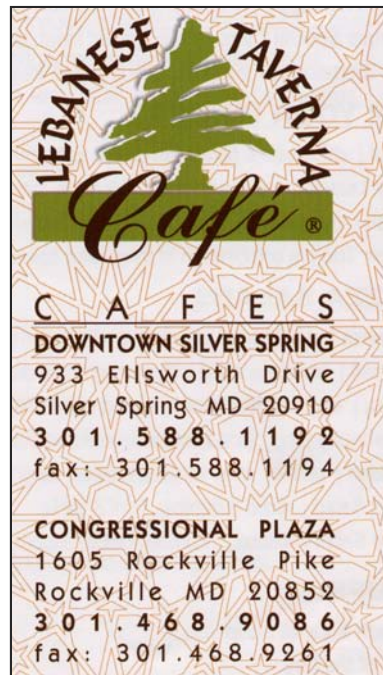
