

ISCA Entrepreneurs at Home: Christopher Lancette

Chris Lancette's fascination with collecting began with old and rare books about the American Revolution, which prompted him to designate a room in his house as a library.

In the process of bouncing around to auctions, he discovered many people were interested only in the most expensive and oldest items. With patience and planning, he realized he could pick up enough affordably priced merchandise to re-sell and make a profit. And so began a side interest that has blossomed into a major preoccupation for Lancette and his girlfriend Won-Ok Kim.

They now buy and sell an array of house products, especially used furniture. "I think we made something like a \$150 profit on the first dining table set we bought, and we've been hooked ever since—despite the fact this does involve a ton of physically punishing work," Lancette says.

He calls the business Orion's Attic, named in memory of a much-loved Siberian husky that he nursed back to health from severe abuse by previous owner while living in the Atlanta area.

Orion's Attic became an official entity early in 2011, and Lancette hopes it might someday grow to be his principal occupation. Until then, he's working as a communications director for a nonprofit organization, while Kim, a Korea native who became a U.S. citizen last year, works as a hospital database manager.

Chris Lancette and Won-Ok Kim, of Orion's Attic and this month's ISCA Entrepreneur profile. Lancette describes Orion's Attic as a "multi-faceted, home-based discount antique and flea business," which carries antiques and collectibles, art and used furniture, selling online through a web store (www.orionsattic.com), eBay, Craigs List and consignment shops. He's also run sizable yard sales, which he says soon will morph into "upscale garage sales" now that he holds a two-year lease on a house on Ocala Street with a three-bay, two-level garage. The home shop is open by appointment.

"Our mission is focused not just on making a profit but making a difference," Lancette says. "Our mantra is to enable people to buy good stuff (and) do great things." Orion's Attic donates 10 percent of profits to House With A Heart Senior Pet Sanctuary in Gaithersburg.

On the Orion's Attic website, ISCA residents can browse around the current offerings, sign up for Lancette's e-newsletter and follow his blog.

The business is growing more quickly than Lancette figured "so we're beginning to look at commercial real estate and explore whether it may be possible to open a store in the next year or two."

For the time being, though, Lancette and Kim spend most of their free time earning bumps and bruises from moving all the furniture and boxes of new items they find while scouring the roads near and far.





Painless Fund-raising Support

If you haven't already pledged your support to another school, please consider supporting Northwood High School – which draws a number of students from the Indian Spring neighborhood – through your weekly grocery shopping.

Northwood runs a painless fund-raising program with these options:

- If you shop at Snider's, save your receipts and when you have a few in hand, contact ISCA resident Susan Luck, a Northwood parent, at susanluck@comcast.net to arrange for pickup of the receipts. Northwood receives 1 percent of their value in a yearly grant from Snider's.
- If you shop at Safeway or Giant, send the member / account number on the back of your Safeway Club card and/or Giant Bonus card to Susan Luck at susanluck@comcast.net. The store will contribute one percent of your purchases to Northwood. The school relies on this fund for a third of its PTSA budget for student programs and activities.

Whenever Montgomery Blair and Northwood tangle in an athletic contest, the decibel levels are a little louder and the emotions definitely run higher. ISCA families have students at both high schools.

The two schools' basketball teams will square off early in the 2011-12 season, on Friday, Dec. 9, as follows:

- Boys basketball, Blair at Northwood, varsity 7 p.m.,
 JV 5:15 p.m.
- Girls basketball, Northwood at Blair, varsity 7 p.m., 5:15 p.m.

One of the backcourt stars for Blair this season is senior Myla Sapp, who averaged about 15 point per game last winter. Myla, daughter of Phil and xxxxx Sapp, also is the online sports editor for Silver Chips, the student newspaper.

Block Scheduling Reconsidered

Northwood HS has taken up discussion over whether to retain its distinctive eight-period block schedule – in which students have four extended course periods one day and then four different courses the next day – or to return to the standard, seven-period daily schedule used at most high schools.

The school system requires a three-stage decision-making process involving multiple stakeholders. Ultimately, the school's instructional leadership team, consisting largely of faculty and administrators, will make a recommendation to Montgomery County Public Schools administration.

A final decision will be made by February when the 2012-13 class registration process commences.

Northwood has used a block schedule since opening its doors in 2004, one of the few schools in the Washington area with this type of schedule. Block scheduling provides students with extra opportunities to take course electives and allows internships in the senior year. (This fall 75 of the 275 seniors are serving as interns at outside organizations and professional offices.)


