Silver Spring is a border town located across the street from the nation's capital. Many of our neighbors work for the federal government or have jobs that provide support, advice or advocate for government policies. This devoted focus on what happens in the White House or the Capitol sometimes diverts our attention from important issues closer to home.



Did you know that in the days before President
Barack Obama started his second term
the Maryland General Assembly started its 433rd legislative session? The
General Assembly – comprised of the House of Delegates and the Senate –
meets in Annapolis for 90 days and is tasked with approving a state budget
and other laws.

Residents of Indian Spring live in District 20, which is one of 47 legislative districts in the state. Our elected representatives, considered by many as the most progressive leaders in the state, are senator Jamie Raskin and delegates Sheila Hixson, Tom Hucker and Heather Mizeur.

Thousands of bills are written every year by the state's 47 senators and 141 delegates, but getting a bill to become law is sometimes an arduous task (the Schoolhouse Rocks song "I'm Just a Bill" pertains to Annapolis too). Below are some of the high profile issues being pursued by our elected officials.

- Death penalty repeal
- Transgender equality
- Fracking ban
- Gun safety
- Creation of offshore wind power farms
- Transportation funding

Organizations that support or oppose these legislative goals usually organize "lobbying days" in Annapolis so that lawmakers hear directly from constituents. If you feel passionately about these topics or others, please contact our leaders and share your views.





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Table for One

After my husband and I left AFI in search of a quick bite to eat, we happened upon La Malinche – a new restaurant right across Colesville Road from AFI in the heart of downtown Silver Spring. La Malinche has only been open 3 months, but provided an unexpected delight of food and drinks on this cold January night.

As explained by our server, "La Malinche" was a woman from the Mexican Gulf Coast, who played a role in the Spanish conquest of Mexico, acting as interpreter, advisor, lover, and intermediary for Hernán Cortés. A dramatic painting of her hangs on the back wall of the restaurant greeting everyone who enters. Accordingly, La Malinche specializes in Spanish and Mexican tapas dishes, or small plates.

My husband and I decided to take seats at the bar (making a more appropriate title of this review "Barstools for Two" instead of "Table for One"). But this proved to be the right decision, since our bartender/server was also co-owner and could give us the history on the restaurant, tell us about the chef's credentials, and make personal recommendations about what to order.

Once seated at the bar, we immediately noticed large glass jars of beverages – three types of sangria with marinating fruit chunks, a large jar of fresh pineapple

floating in vodka, and a most unusual jar of tequila filled with slices of fresh jalapeno peppers! And I must stop here and report that the two drinks we tried were outstanding – the jalapeno margarita and the pineapple-vodka martini. Truly nothing we had tried before.

For dinner, we ordered per the bartender's recommendations – Calavo y Limon (garlic-infused guacamole prepared with creamy Calavo avocados), garlicky Gambas a la Cazuela (sautéed shrimp with while wine and garlic), Calamares a la Andaluza (incredibly light and crispy calamari) and Buey al Jerez (grilled steak served with sherry cream mushroom sauce). All of these tapas dishes were uniquely flavored, incredibly tasty, and very pleasing to the palate. In particular, the beef and seafood were fresh and perfectly cooked.

La Malinche's new Web site shows photos of their tapas plates on their home page (web address provided below) and includes their full menu. Reservations are not required, but can be made – and we made our Valentine's Dinner reservation the way out the door.

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Social Dads


