30th year, is a way to promote police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie in order to send a message to criminals that citizens are uniting against crime.

We were joined by our local Montgomery County and Park police who arrived in an impressive caravan of motorcycles and police cars. Attendees had the opportunity to talk with the officers individually about any questions of concern during their visit, and the kids in attendance had the chance to get a high-five from the men and women in uniform while reinforcing the

association between the police uniform and safety.

The officers stated that we live in a very safe neighborhood. The crime we experience most

often is "theft from vehicles." They said that, most often, this theft results from car doors that are not locked. And valuables – including money, GPS units, cell phones, cameras and even purses – are mistakenly left inside the cars. This "crime of opportunity" has been going on as



ISCA TEEN PRODUCES HIT IN HER THEATER **DEBUT**

Montgomery Blair High School sophomore Arielle Granatstein Gottlieb wrote, directed and performed this summer in her own original play, cleverly titled "Coming Out Straight."

Gottlieb, who has lived on Baden Street in Indian Spring for 15 years, was part of a group project during the past year in her high school English class called "The Inspiration Project." She co-wrote the short play with three friends, Abby Rowland, Leah Savage and Nika Seider.

The girls' intent was to increase public awareness for gay children who are having difficulty "coming out." In a recent phone interview, Gottlieb said, "Although I'm not gay myself, I do have gay friends that I wanted to support by publicly addressing LGBT bullying in order to prevent abuse."

Her play was selected from a large group of short plays to be produced and performed at the Takoma Park Community Center on June 4. The play was part of a series of short works that were only 10 minutes long, at most.

In performing "Coming Out Straight," a comical play full of satire, Gottlieb played the character of Anamaria, a business woman and the wife of the woman played by Rowland. Savage played the couple's straight daughter, while Seider played her phony girlfriend, who announces she was coming out straight.

Gottlieb says the script addresses a major contemporary issue, and she believes the entire production turned out to be a fantastic success.

Even though Gottlieb hasn't yet decided if she wants to pursue a career as an actress or a playwright, she will do well in whatever path she chooses. As a 10th grader in the Communication Arts Program at Blair HS, she and

the program's other 75 students will create short films, along with other interdisciplinary projects that involve the use of various media. Gottlieb said she also will create a blog for herself to display the work that she's completed throughout the school year. She also expects to learn how to use Photoshop.

CAP is a selective-admission humanities-focused program offered only at Blair.

Undoubtedly, Gottlieb will soon be producing a short film that will be just as convincing as her recent play. What a great addition these productions will be on her resume when she likely begins her college studies in fall 2017. *

ISCA RESIDENT ENDS CAREER IN PUBLIC PARKS MANAGEMENT

Indian Spring's Mary Bradford has dedicated her lifetime to the development and redevelopment of our public parks.

After 40 years in government roles overseeing parks and recreation, Bradford this summer retired as director of Montgomery Parks, part of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, a position she held since 2006.

Bradford, who lives on Long Branch Parkway, has been able to influence the creation of various parks in the county, including a dog park, a skateboarding park and an equestrian park. With an annual budget of \$100 million, she was able to oversee 35,000 acres of parkland consisting of 420 parks. She assisted in purchasing properties by collaborating with state and federal agencies to preserve much-needed green space for public use.

Bradford said she considered the latter among her most essential roles. She noted that some area parks are built around high schools to influence the community's enjoyment of nature.

She said her favorite part about working as Montgomery Parks director was her interactions with many of the 700 dedicated and responsive staff employed by the agency, all working to meet the community's needs.

In a phone interview recently, Bradford described the rigors of running such a big operation serving the public. "The most difficult challenge to work through was managing everyone and making sure resource quotas were met and supervising the park police so we all can feel safe," she said.

Prior to leading Montgomery
Parks, Bradford served three
decades with the National
Park Service, beginning as a
seasonal park ranger. She rose
to become associate director for
administration for the National
Park Service in Washington D.C.



Bradford, who traveled widely as a child, attended 14 different schools, including a high school in Madrid, Spain. She started college in Germany as she pursued a passion for the outdoors. The international journey eventually landed Bradford in Maryland when she transferred her German college credits to the University of Maryland, from which she earned a B.A. before collecting a master's degree in management from the Stanford University Graduate School of Business and a law degree from Georgetown University.

Bradford and her husband
Bill, who moved to the Indian
Spring neighborhood in 1974,
have two grown children and
three grandchildren. According
to the county's official press
release announcing her
retirement, she and Bill plan
Çto travel and spend time at
their homes in Delaware and
Florida.*

FALL FEST AND ISCA MEMBERSHIP


