

INDIAN SPRING HISTORY: FROM ESSINGTON TO CHARLES AND WILLIAM

In the March newsletter, I covered the arrival and rise of the Beall family in the 1600s as pioneer settlers. Ninian Beall owned an 18,000-acre parcel that included present-day Indian Spring. In 1688, Henry Darnall purchased a portion of land and called it Girl's Portion. It was on the east side of Rock Creek and encompassed what is currently Kensington and Forest Glen up to Georgia Avenue. Henry Darnall came to Maryland in 1664, and he held various positions in the colony. He was a member of the Governor's Council and Keeper of the Great Seal. At that time, Ninian Beall still owned the land adjacent to Girl's Portion that included present-day Indian Spring. With Beall's death in 1717, his expanse of land was divided among his heirs. The future Indian Spring would remain in Ninian



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Beall's granddaughter's possession until 1760.

As a side note, Calvert County originally contained all of what now is Prince George's County, Frederick County and Montgomery County. Prince George's County was established in 1696 and Frederick County was established in 1743. Montgomery County was not established until 1776.

Henry Clark was born in Prince George's County in 1737, as the son of Abraham Clark III and a fourth-generation Marylander. His greatgrandfather, Abraham Clark the first, was wealthy, considering he paid his passage from England in 1654. At that time most settlers were indentured servants.

Henry Clark grew up on the family plantation known as Essington. This plantation was located in present-day Bowie on the west side of the Patuxent River and was a 996 acre parcel of land. Tobacco was the mainstay of currency at the time.

Henry and Ann had 11 children in addition to her two children from her first marriage. She had these 11 children within 18 years, the first born in 1762 and the last born in 1778 when she was 45. The farm continued to prosper, allowing them to buy additional parcels to the north known as White Oak Valley and Hills & Dales. In addition to tobacco, the farm produced many different crops and included a large orchard where Montgomery Blair High School and the Beltway are now located.

With the inception of Montgomery County in 1776, Henry Clark established the first land patent in Montgomery County known as Fenwick, which bordered the District in presentday downtown Silver Spring. Henry was also a member of the first Grand Jury in Montgomery County

alongside other noted families such as the Magruders, the Veirs, the Muncasters and the Bealls. Local farm trade provided farm goods for much of the county at that time.

Henry Clark passed away in 1806 and left the portion of land that is currently Indian Spring to his youngest child, Henson Clark.

As an Indian Spring native, it is hard for me to imagine our area as treeless farmland, but that's what it was.



PEEPS' DAY AT THE BEACH, DESIGNED BY PEEPITECTURE

Created by Stephen Brundage, 45, Patricia Brundage, 45, and Nevan Brundage, 10, Silver Spring, Md.

The National Building Museum's hugely popular "Beach" installation — which turned the museum's Great Hall into an oceanic play area for two months last summer — used nearly 1 million translucent plastic balls to create the effect. The Brundage family needed only 8,500 tiny plastic pearls to re-create it.



Working from an idea generated by Nevan, who had attended a summer program at the Building Museum, the three collaborators set out to capture the essence of the installation, which was designed by the art partnership known as Snarkitecture (called Peepitecture here) and attracted long lines. Though most of the diorama's visitors enjoyed carefree summer fun involving Peepsicles, swim rings and beach balls, some lost personal items. If you look through the plexiglass cutaway the Brundages built into the diorama, you can see a trove of loose coins and lost shoes. A lost-and-found box holds a tiny engagement ring, evoking the real one that went missing(but was found weeks later).

This is Mom and Dad's first foray into the world of Peeps dioramas. Nevan is the veteran, having worked on two submissions that were featured in KidsPost. The then-9-year-old came up with the idea of a Peep in a rowboat fishing for — what else? — flip-flops.

The idea of grownups making art out of Peeps may sound silly, but once you let go of your inhibitions, who can resist? Kind of like jumping into a giant ball pit.
