ISCA members add spice and community spirit to Fall Fest by Matt Mulkey

Food, crafts, music, plus a chance to make new friends and reconnect with old ones drew dozens of families to the Indian Spring Citizens Association Fall Fest on Oct. 23. More than 50 residents donated their time, talents, and raffle-worthy prizes to ensure that adults and children alike enjoyed a beautiful autumn afternoon with their neighbors.

An ISCA tradition for more than a decade, Fall Fest would not be complete without a chili cook-off. Eighteen community members filled their crock pots with an array of meaty - and some not-so-meaty - entries, with hopes of claiming the Golden Ladle trophy, made this year by Monica "Mo" Bridgewater and her son, Roy. Attendees sampled the contenders and, with barely a spoonful left in any pot, cast their ballots.


While entrants such as El Diablo and the Red Dragon promised the ISCA electorate a tongue-sizzling experience, most voters threw their support behind a recipe referencing another heated battle this fall: Hillary's Chiliry, a tribute whipped up by Dan Freedman. Chris Clark's Cha Cha Loco Chili and Mark Thibault's Detroit Chili took second and third place honors, respectively.

Dan, now a two-time winner of the Golden Ladle, described his 2016 creation as a "strictly little of this, little of that" effort. One new twist, he said, was the use of Twin Springs chipotle-infused ketchup, a fortuitous find made by his wife, Mary Anne Hess, at the Takoma Park farmer's market.

# Indian Spring History: A Civil Matter

In the October newsletter, we covered the end of the American Revolution and the formation of Montgomery County. The Clark farm was then 220 acres, from Indian Spring Drive to Sligo Avenue and from Colesville Road to University Boulevard (then called Bladensburg Road). In 1856, Charles H. Clark and Oliver H.P. Clark were the landowners/farmers. Charles and his wife Frances began to raise their children, Mary and Franklin, in the original homestead located behind what is now 101 Franklin Avenue. Oliver married Ann Catherine Coupard, and it is noted on the marriage license that his mother gave her permission for him to marry, as he was a minor at the time. Oliver and his wife built their home on the land between Indian Spring Drive and University. This house would become the starting point for the Indian Spring Clubhouse, which is now the YMCA.


In November 1860, Abraham Lincoln was elected the 16th President of the United States. The Civil War began on April 12, 1861. That summer, Charles Clark was drafted at the age of 32 .


The Battle of Antietam was fought on September 17th, 1861, with many local men fighting in the bloodiest single day in American history. Charles survived Antietam and returned home to Indian Spring, stopping in the family orchard (located where the Beltway is presently). Family lore has it that he gorged himself on unripened cherries and was found dead under a cherry tree in the orchard.

Following Charles passing, his wife Frances and two children, Mary and Franklin, remained on the property. Charles died with no will, so the property was put into a trust by William Viers Bouic, a prominent lawyer from the Viers family.
F.P. Blair was a noted member of President Lincoln's cabinet. Frances Clark and F.P. Blair would become very close friends, and they agreed to be named the executor of each other's will. As of 1864, Frances had sold a five-acre parcel to Montgomery Blair (F.P. Blair's son). That parcel was from Sligo Creek to Franklin Avenue and from Colesville Road to Worth Avenue. Montgomery Blair built his home on the land.

Franklin's uncle, Oliver Clark, mentored him growing up. Oliver continued to live in the house that is now the YMCA. He and his wife, Anne Catherine, had 4 children and remained close with Franklin and his family.

In 1882, Frances Clark died of "consumption." Franklin was then 28 and a livestock veterinarian serving all of Montgomery County, traveling by horse and buggy. The land was released from the trust to Franklin. His older sister, Mary, married George Dallas Mullican. George and Mary bought a parcel of land from Mr. Brunett that is located at Forest Glen. On July 12, 1887, Franklin married Caroline Virginia Scholl from Dickerson, Maryland. cont on Page 7

In 1889, Anna Grace Clark was born to Franklin and Caroline, followed by the births of Frank "Paul" Clark and Donald E. Clark. They were raised in the family home located behind what is now 101 Franklin Avenue.

In 1899, Franklin's Uncle Oliver Clark was a Montgomery County Circuit Court judge. He passed away in 1911, five years before Franklin's death.

An interesting note at the time was the invention of the automobile in the late 1800's that changed the course of history. In the final Indian Spring History article, we will discuss what was happening here during the two World
